

Gooey Toffee Butter Squares by Janice Rose

For Cake:

1 box yellow cake mix 1 egg ½ cup (1 stick) unsalted butter, melted

For Filling:

1 8oz package cream cheese, softened 2 eggs 1 teaspoon vanilla extract 1 16 oz box confectioners' sugar ½ cup unsalted butter, melted ¾ cup toffee bits ¾ cup mini chocolate chips

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly grease a 13 by 9 by 2 inch baking pan.

For cake: with electric mixer, combine cake mix, egg and butter in a bowl and mix well. Pat into the bottom of prepared pan and set aside.

For filling: using electric mixer, beat the cream cheese until smooth. Beat in the eggs and vanilla. Add confectioners' sugar and beat well. Reduce speed and slowly pour in butter. Mix well. Fold in toffee bits and chocolate chips, reserving a little bit.

Pour the filling onto cake mixture and spread evenly. Sprinkle reserved toffee and chocolate on top. Bake for 40 to 50 minutes. The center should be a little gooey, so don't bake past that point.

Remove from oven and allow to cool completely. Cut into squares.

Yakitori Recipe by Yoko Kurosawa

Serves 50:

5 pounds fresh chicken thighs Skewers (available at Safeway) For Yakitori Sauce:

1 cup soy sauce

1 cup Mirin (sweet saki used for cooking) 10 tablespoons sugar

Crushed red peppers (optional) (Togarashi crushed red pepper is sold at Japanese markets)

Trim fat and chop the thighs into 1-inch cubes. Thread them on the skewers not leaving any space in between.

Mix the soy sauce, the Mirin and sugar. Boil down to two-thirds cup.

Prepare a natural wood charcoal (Whole Foods sells this). Heat up the grill. Grill the skewed chicken thighs turning frequently to slightly brown. With a brush, spread the Yakitori sauce on the thighs and grill for 30 seconds; turn and repeat on the other side, being careful not to burn. Repeat the procedure and serve the Yakitori chicken thighs hot.

For extra taste, sprinkle on red hot peppers.

Pest Control...By Carla Dietz

I wanted to share some information I got from Ryan Rosson, owner of Vanish Integrated Pest Control. There is a problem with rats in our area. These pests are nocturnal and are often unnoticed by many homeowners. Ryan said that he sees evidence of the rats in nearly all homes here. They are attracted to our yards and onto our roofs. They especially like to inhabit barbeque grills. Grills with no sealed cover around them are very inviting. Ryan says that the rats like to feed on any leftover food crumbs left on the grill and the area under it. They leave droppings in our yard where our children play.

Ryan has advised that these pests can be reduced or eliminated if we all join together in a neighborhood effort in not only trapping or using bait, but also by not leaving food (dog or cat, bird seed or human) out to attract them. If you have a garden, you may want to cover it to keep the rats out. Otherwise, we may just be temporarily driving them from yard to yard for a time. Smoke Detectors

I recently replaced all our smoke detectors that were original to our home. The reason is that we were awakened at 7:00 a.m. one morning to the BEEP of all the detectors in the house! After investigating online, I found that smoke detectors have a life of 7 to 10 years. When I pulled down each of the units, I found a notice on them that said "Replace prior to 2005." They were right. Our system is AC and all the units are linked together. This way, if one sounds, they all do. The BRK brand we have in our homes is no longer available, however, BRK makes a new unit (model BRK 9120B). They also have a combination Smoke and Carbon Monoxide unit (model SC9120B). Both can be mixed in the system and both are compatible with our installations. purchased 5 new detectors and installed 10year Lithium Ion 9-volt batteries in them. The SC9120B's can be purchased for \$47.70 and the 9120B's for \$12.51 from a place

If you add an entry in the contacts list in your cell phone under ICE with the name and phone number of the person that the emergency personnel should call on your behalf, you can save them a lot of time and have your family contacted quickly. It only takes a few moments of your time to do.
