Online Forums will allow us to share important information regarding topics of interest - topics including recommended household vendors, babysitters and pet sitters, tutors and handyman. Now you can choose a service provider with confidence given that your neighbors have had success. But, to make this new service useful, we need you to share your knowledge by inputing your favorite providers. Who is your preferred handyman, fence repair person, tutor or electrician? Each household that is a current paid-up member of the association has an account. Your user name is your last name, such as jones. Each account's initial password is changeme which you should change. (We have two households named Lo, and so we created accounts lo6426 and lo6568 using their house numbers.)

Click on the FAQ link near the upper right to get tips on how to use Online Forums. In particular, to change your password or e-mail address: (1) Click the "User Control Panel" link near the upper left. (2) Click the "Profile" tab. (3) Click "Edit account settings". (4) You can then change your password or e-mail address.

# **Trespassing In Our Open Space**

In our last newsletter we discussed the problem of kids loitering, drinking and/or "doing drugs" in the open space. As we noted, we talked with the police and they requested that we call 311 when we see a potential problem and ask for a dispatcher. The police will send a patrol car and ask the kids to leave. They are trespassing and are not allowed to congregate. They believe that if the trespassers are frequently asked to leave, they will find a new place to gather. It will be our win and somebody else's loss.

Feedback from numerous neighbors is that they are calling the police and seeing results! So, keep it up. Call 311 every time you see a group of kids heading into the hills. Let's move them along to someplace else.

# **Almaden Burglaries**

You may have heard about and/or read about a string of burglaries close to us in Almaden. The Almaden Times and the Almaden Resident both published an article updating us on this topic. In case you missed it, here is a summary.

- 63 burglaries committed in our area between June 2009 and September 8, 2009. Most have occurred Monday through Friday in the daylight hours between 9 am and 5 pm.
- In August, the police arrested three young men tied to the evidence in some of the Almaden burglaries.
- It is believed that other teams, probably youth, are committing break-ins as well.
- Suspects usually knock on the front door and if no one is home gain entrance through the backyard, entering an unlocked side gate or side garage door.
- •Police suggest locking your side gates and installing an alarm system. Police said that if potential burglars see a red alarm light that indicates that the alarm is on, they often will move to another house.

Since every Pinn home has an installed security system, we encourage you to activate your system and use it when you are not home. Seemingly, this is one of the best things we can do to stop a burglary.

## **Dumpster Day Success**

Once again, we filled up a dumpster in only 3 hours! Last year, the most numerous item was old patio umbrellas. This year, old student desk chairs took the honor.

# Eagle Scout Project - By Evan Camacho (6508 Graystone Meadow Circle)

For my Eagle Project I am rebuilding and refurbishing three benches from the San Jose History Museum. I am replacing the wood which has rotted away and am repainting the legs of the benches. I am using IPE wood, an extremely durable wood that will not wither for an estimated one hundred years. And, it does not require any special treatment which cuts down on maintenance.

#### Who Will Benefit?

The San Jose History Museum will benefit because this will make the museum grounds look better. Since many of the benches have splinters and are all but destroyed, it would be uncomfortable and even dangerous for people to sit on them. They could also end up with splinters in their hands or in their bottoms. Considering that the museum has had to lay people off because of lack of funds, refurbishing the benches is a great contribution and a great way of being active in the community.

### **Project Details**

The first step of my project was to take one bench from the museum and gather up measurements and calculations. Once calculations had been collected I established a budget of \$450. Then I bought the wood and other supplies. Southern Lumber cut and drilled all the wood to my specifications. My plan is to construct the benches one at a time so that if I make a mistake, it would only affect one bench. I did all the painting and the assembling was done by my father and me. All of the sandblasting and wood cutting was done by SRS Industries and Southern Lumber, respectively.

#### **Donations Needed**

I have raised approximately \$150 for this project, leaving a balance of \$300. I would very much appreciate any donation from my neighbors to help me complete my Eagle Scout project. Nothing is too small! Thank you very much.
